PROGRAMME OF ACTIVITIES IN FRANCE

Saturday 23 November 2019, 9.00-19.00 Les journées de l'Arbre, de la Plante et du Fruit – Free visit Espace Paulhan, Avenue de la Résistance, Saint-Jean-du-Gard (Gard)



Michèle Auvergne suggests a day outing to St-Jean-du-Gard, to meet the 170 exhibitors and discover their specialties: nurserymen, producers, craftsmen, artists, environmental associations and small scale farming, specialist bookstore and pop-up eateries. By the way, do not miss the must-haves: sweet onion donuts (from the Cévennes of course!) and chestnut flour crepes. The theme this year will be: Tomatoes - The tree and the forest.

For those who are interested, Michèle suggests a visit to the museum of the Cevennes valleys: the Maison Rouge. It is the last silk spinning mill to have closed down in France in 1965 and which has been transformed into a contemporary museum on the theme of life in the Cevennes during the silk production period. The programme includes a free lecture on humanist photography by Pierre Schwartz at 15.00. We suggest meeting at 14.45 in front of the entrance of the museum in order to benefit from the group half price entry fee (4 euros).

The Maison Rouge: 5 rue de l'Industrie (pedestrian entrance) or 35 Grand'rue 'parking) in St-Jean-du-Gard. Open Wednesday to Sunday from 14.00 to 18.00. Don't forget to dress warmly because it can get very cold.*

Thursday 5 December, 10.00 Sauvian, Hérault



Elisabeth Gratraud is organising a visit to an oil mill near Béziers on Thursday, December 5 at 10.00. We will see oil being extracted, and take part in oil tasting. There will also be the opportunity to purchase products. This mill is owned by Mr. DALLENS, gold medalist, olive oil, in 2018 and 2019 at the Concours Agricole in Paris. He also produces table Lucques olives. A lunch will be organised in a restaurant in Sauvian, 5 minutes from the mill, for 15.90 € or 20 € depending on the day's market produce. Starter, main course of the day, and dessert. The menu will be confirmed at a later date.

In Béziers, Elizabeth Gratraud is organising an afternoon visit recommended by the Tourist Office with one of their guides. This will include the Plateau des Poètes, a large park with rare tree and plant specimens

and listed sculptures, and the Old Cemetery, also adorned with old sculptures. The price of the visit is approximately 10 € per person.

Saturday 29 February, 14.00 Montferrier-sur-Lez (Hérault) Conference on citrus fruit

21 – 27 April, The Maremma, ITALY Wild flora and scenery of Southern Tuscany



This walking tour, organised by Mediterranean Plants and Gardens and led by Professor Goffredo Filibeck of the University of Tuscia, is for those who enjoy hiking. The habitats of wild flora will include macchia, woodland, beaches, grassland, canyons and hilltop villages. Interesting article from CHS News, September 2019

Christine Daniels writes:

This article in CHS News, about TreeKeepers, an organisation dedicated to the protection of urban trees, caught my eye.

Cape Town's tree canopy and treekeepers objectives



TreeKeepers is a citizens' organisation that came together to protect big trees mainly in the Southern Suburbs of Cape Town. A relationship has been formed with the City's Parks Department to help conserve and maintain the urban forest. They assist fellow residents to look after mature trees in their gardens and to work with City Council staff to ensure that no trees along roads and on public land are cut down without good reason.

Visit their website https://treekeeperscapetown.org.za/ where you can report unnecessary or illegal pruning or felling under "Tree Alerts". Contact details for the City's Department of Recreation and Parks, who have jurisdiction over trees in all public places, are also available.

Henk Egberink, guest speaker at the October CHS meeting, will discuss the benefits of trees in an urban environment, the relevance of the Paris Climate Accord and what other countries and cities have achieved, as well as a short description of TreeKeepers' objectives, what the organisation has achieved and where they need to do more.

This seems to be a very worthwhile project. Does anyone know of a similar organisation in France?

List of plants which survived well during this summer's heatwave (follow-up)

Maurizio Casale (Phytotrend, San Remo, Italy) writes

«This summer is really horrible ... Some grasses drought resistant: Muhlenbergia rigens and Muhlenbergia dubia very drought resistant, even the other Muhlenbergia, may be a little less (capillaris, reverchonii and lindheimeri); Jarava ichu and surely Nassella tenuissima, Andropogon scoparius Blaze, Andropogon gerardii, Pennisetum massaicum, Cortaderia selloana Pumila, Stipa gigantea, Eragrostis curvula, E. elliottii, Ampelodesmos mauritanicus, Miscanthus capensis, Sporolobus airoides, Lygeum spartum.»
