## Saturday 26 January, 15.00, La médiathèque Albert Camus, Clapiers, Hérault A talk by Olivier Filippi

## Saturday 9 March, 9.00 – 12.00, Prades le Lez, Hérault A walk in the Domaine de Restinclières to discover edible wild plants



John Walsh, of Les Écologistes de l'Euzière, will guide us on a botanical walk around the domain to discover edible wild plants. We will learn how to recognize the plants and identify the best conditions to pick them. The walk is on flat ground and suitable for all. It will be followed by a wild salad tasting with a glass of local wine.

Bilingual activity French/English. Numbers limited to 20 participants. The price will be from 13 to 25€ per person, dependent on the number of attendees.

## Wednesday 20 March, La Bambouseraie d'Anduze, Gard A garden visit and a talk, *"Gardening with Mediterranean Plants in the Cévennes"* by Dr John Feltwell



Dr John Feltwell, botanist, ecologist, author and photographer, was one of the first in Britain to promote wildlife gardening through his books 'Doorstep Wildlife' (Hamlyn, 1985) and 'Naturalist's Garden' (Ebury Press, 1987). His website is named <u>Wildlife matters</u>. John's talk will be based on his observation of the nature and habitats of the Basses-Cévennes over 50 years, and on gardening with drought-tolerant plants that thrive in the limestone conditions of the cévenol Causses around Mont Aigoual and the Lozère. He says he will speak in a "mélange of English, French and cévenol"

Participants may wish to arrive in the morning and explore the gardens of the Bambouseraie. The garden has a fabulous collection of camelias, which will be at their best at this time of year. If 20 people would like to visit the garden, we will be able to benefit from a reduced group admission rate and have a guided tour. We can then eat picnic lunches on a covered terrace next to the snack bar. The talk, organised by Catriona McLean and Aline Rideau, in conjunction with les Amis de la Bambouseraie, will take place in the afternoon. ## Atelier de taille

## April, near Le Barroux, Vaucluse A wildflower walk close to Lac du Paty



This event will provide an introduction to some of the tiny but beautiful wild flowers which exist in the Ventoux landscape. The walk will be about 5-6 km, and led by an experienced French guide.

Precise location, date and joining instructions will be advised nearer the time to obtain the best wildflower experience and will depend on how advanced the season is. As wildflowers are best viewed in the cool of the morning, we intend to start at 09.00 and finish with a picnic lunch. The walk will therefore be of interest to those living in the Vaucluse, or willing to stay nearby the previous night.

Participants should wear footwear suitable for uneven ground and be prepared to purchase in advance their own loupe (a small magnifying glass) costing around €15. A loupe is essential for viewing the smallest wildflowers.

Maximum 20 participants, though a second event may be possible if there is substantial interest. There is also the possibility of a wildflower event on Mont Ventoux in May. Attendance is open to members of MGF and a local independent garden group. ## Tuesday 14 May, Ménerbes, Vaucluse

## A day in the Luberon – Le jardin botanique du domaine de la Citadelle and La Louve



Morning:

First, a discovery and tasting of wild edible plants in the field, with Nadine Maffli, head of the association *'Le Silène et L'Ortie'*. Then, guided by Brigitte Bergeron, head of the association *'Un Savoir oublié'* we will visit the jardin botanique du domaine de la Citadelle. In this vineyard, six terraces have been developed to accommodate a wide variety of medicinal and edible plants. Lunch will be served here, a refined picnic with wild seasonal herbs, prepared by Romain Dumas, chef at the restaurant *'l'Atelier l'art des mets'*. The visit will take place in French. A visit to La Louve in Bonnieux, a garden created in the 90s by Nicole de Vésian, designer at Hermès and passionate about the Provencal style of gardening. The garden is on a set of terraces, living and contemplative spaces where stone, natural wood and Mediterranean plants subtly match the local landscape. The property is located in Bonnieux, a charming Provencal village perched on the side of a cliff, with beautiful panoramic views of the Luberon. Cost: 10€.

## 1 – 8 April, International Spring Conference, Évora, Portugal – organised by MGAP "Bringing the Mediterranean Landscape into your Garden"

### 1 – 4 April: Pre-Conference tour based in Armação de Pera, Algarve

Activities will start with welcome drinks on the evening of Monday 1 April and on Tuesday and Wednesday will include visits to private gardens, a guided walk through developing native forest and a coastal wild flower walk along part of the <u>Rota Vicentina</u>. On Thursday there will be a guided visit to the Mediterranean Gardening Association Portugal's botanic garden at Silves, which is dedicated to the native flora of the Barrocal region. In the afternoon participants will travel by coach to Évora.

### 5 – 8 April: Évora

Évora, capital of Portugal's south-central Alentejo region, is a lively university city, and classified as a UNESCO world heritage site. On Friday, participants can choose to either spend a free day exploring Évora, or join a guided visit to the private garden of Conde de Monsaraz, followed by a boat trip to Alqueva Lake for an island wildflower walk and a visit to hill top mediaeval town of Monsaraz. The conference will start on Friday evening with a pre-dinner talk on the history, culture and ecology of the Montando cork oak forests, then on Saturday and Sunday there will be talks in the mornings and outside activities in the afternoons. Speakers include James Basson and Olivier Filippi. Visits will include guided walks and jeep tours of the Montando cork oak forest where there will be many spring flowers in bloom and visits to private and historic gardens.

For those who can stay another day, Marion and Arnold ter Horst have organised a day out in the Alentejo region, to include visits to the Quetzal Winery and restaurant, the Alcáçovas Garden and Paço dos Henriques and an organic herb nursery.



#### Okanagan Xeriscape Association – a new MGi partner

Some months ago, Alfredo Unda made a visit to the Okanagan Valley, in British Columbia, Canada, where he met members of the Okanagan Xeriscape Association (OXA). He was most impressed with what he saw and the people he met, and we put a link to <u>OXA's website</u>, with its extensive illustrated plant database, on our MGi site. Further talks revealed an energetic and knowledgeable garden society whose mission is to promote waterwise gardening in a climate which has hot summers, cold winters and very little rain. A natural next step was to invite OXA to become a partner association in Mediterranean Gardening International. This has now been agreed by all, so, a warm welcome from MGF to our new Canadian friends!

#### Alfredo writes:

In July I visited the Okanagan Xeriscape Association in British Columbia, Canada, to learn about their xeriscaping practice. This is an important gardening technique in sites with low water availability as in La Aurora, Chile.

The Okanagan Valley located in the BC's southern interior is part of the large desert region stretching south to the peninsula of Baja California in Mexico. The region's climate has semi-arid desert conditions, very hot and dry summers reflected in the Okanagan desert ecosystems, mild weather and winters with temperatures a little below freezing, similar to many Mediterranean climate zones.

'Xeriscaping' is the combination of xeros (Greek = dry) and landscape. Where the only plants used are those whose natural requirements are appropriate to the local climate, and care is taken not to lose water through evaporation and losses, the following can be achieved:

- a. 50% reduction or greater of the water used in a conventional garden
- b. Less water used means less maintenance and less spending
- c. Increased property value due to an attractive garden that conserves water
- d. Creation of a landscape that survives in drought conditions
- e. Elimination of the need for toxic herbicides and chemical fertilizers
- f. Reduction of the impact on the environment
- g. Provision of food and habitat for fauna
