Wednesday 1 November to Thursday 9 November Rhodes, Greece: its history and plants

MPG is offering a trip to see wild flora and visit the island's impressive historical sites in early November. Members should see autumn-flowering cyclamen, colchicum, crocus, muscari, pancratium, biarum and remarkable trees. This will be after the main tourist season so the island will be pleasantly uncrowded. It is difficult to predict the weather which may be balmy, rainy or a mix of both. The cost including accommodation, six lunches, six dinners, local transport and guiding will be around £950/1,100€ per person (single suppl £155/180€), flights and airport transfers not included. Maximum 20 people. Guide: Yiannis Christofides, author of two books on the flora of Cyprus. Two hotels: one in Rhodes town and the other in a village at the foot of Attavyros Mountain in the west. Trees, trees, trees....

David Bracey writes "I have tried to summarize two articles mentioned by Pierre in the last newsletter. Both refer to the importance of trees: "American Forests" and "Water, use it wisely. Trees are cool" Desertification can arise when trees are cut down. Planting trees has the opposite effect. Here are some benefits from planting trees.

Trees intercept rain, slow down erosion and flooding Trees recycle nutrients, again and again Trees provide shade which reduces soil temperatures and drying out Trees transpire into the air and clouds which then act as a source of water. Clouds move Trees provide cool shade, especially on a hot day Trees absorb carbon dioxide and other gases Trees produce oxygen Cooling reduces energy consumption Trees provide wildlife habitat, beauty and relaxation areas

Additionally evaporation causes cooling. Hotter air expands into this space bringing in moisture, creating lower temperatures and thus sucking in more moisture and so on. A positive loop.

This is the general rule but of course there are exceptions.
