PROGRAMME OF ACTIVITIES IN FRANCE

Thursday August 29, 11.00 am. Montpellier Exchange of ideas and plants Chantal Guiraud writes:

"You are invited to a planning meeting. at my home, at 75, rue de la Vieille Poste, 34000 Montpellier to exchange ideas on future activities and garden visits. After our exchange of ideas, I suggest an exchange of plants or seeds for autumn planting. Bring your own picnic and we will provide hot and cold drinks (coffee, tea, wine). Don't forget to bring your plants to exchange with other members. Members who cannot be present can also send their proposals to me by e-mail."

Thursday 12 September, the Luberon, Vaucluse A visit to the gardens of La Citadelle and La Louve Organised by Nanouk Pelen and Hedwige Lauwaert

A trip to the Luberon to visit the Jardin Botanique du Domaine viticole de la Citadelle in Ménerbes, and the Jardin Remarquable of La Louve in Bonnieux. <u>La Citadelle</u> sits in a green setting extending over 5 hectares, with magnificent views. We will walk for around 1h30, accompanied by the gardener, to discover aromatic plants, edible wild medicinal plants and 'la truffière'. Lunch either at the estate's bistro or bring a picnic.

In the afternoon we will drive to Bonnieux to visit La Louve, a privately owned garden created in 1986 by Nicole de Vésian, a designer at Hermès, who continued to work on the garden until she sold it in 1996. Having had several owners since then, the garden has had some additions, but the original design remains and is famous for its sculptural clipped Mediterranean plants and trees, stone pathways and benches, and views of the surrounding landscape. We will be given a guided tour by the head gardener.

Thursday 26 September Visits to two properties in Vallauris Golfe-Juan, Alpes-Maritimes Organised by Jacqueline Potter

In the morning, we will visit the estate of Adrien Strutynski, a professional citrus grower in Vallauris. He will introduce us to his estate, present different varieties of citrus, share the history of his plantation and his future plans and reveal his secrets for cultivating and maintaining healthy citrus trees.



Next, about a five-minute drive away, we will visit the magnificent garden of Annie Zanini in Golfe-Juan. Annie has an exceptional garden with a wide variety of plants and trees adapted to the mild climate of Golfe Juan, as well as plants suited to colder, inland regions. Before starting the afternoon visit, we can picnic in her 'atelier', which is equipped with tables and chairs.

- In November, we will visit the Nicole Arboireau's garden, 'Pomme d'Ambre', in Fréjus (Var). Located at the foot of the Estérel massif, this garden, created in 1980, is a true conservatory of the flora of coastal Provence. It features exotic plants introduced during the Belle Époque as well as more regional flora. The Pomme d'Ambre is a garden of bygone memories, a collection of local plants with forgotten uses...
- In early February, we are planning a visit to the 'Forêt des Mimosas' in Pégomas, near Cannes.

A one-week tour in south-west Turkey exploring habitats from the coast to the higher slopes, which still harbour stunning old growth cedar forests. There will be visits to Simena, Phaselis and Termessos, for the wild flora as well as for their history. Participants should see many species of colchicum, crocus and cyclamen and sternbergia. The leader will be Başak Gardner.

Seed List - Summer 2024 update







As usual at this time of year, Chantal Guiraud has updated our seed list. Thank you to all who sent seeds to add to the collection. Particular thanks to Dave Tivol, a member of our partner association, the California Horticultural Society, who supplied some interesting seeds from the USA, including the following:

Le jardin du Couvent de la Visitation, L'Hôtel du Couvent, Nice

Mireille Fourie, the Couvent de la Visitation's gardener, writes :

Three months ago, a new garden (designed by Tom Stuart-Smith with the involvement of James Basson in the selection of plants) was opened on the abandoned terraces of Le Couvent de la Visitation. Now converted into a hotel, the convent was formerly an integral part of the old town, and the garden retains its role at the heart of the community, preserving the ancient functions of a convent-type garden, i.e. a garden for nourishment, self-sufficiency and meditation.

The renovated terraces have been transformed into several individual gardens, from the wild terraces at the top, to the herb, vegetable garden, and washhouse terraces, then the orange tree courtyard, at the ground floor level of the building, and the tropical garden terrace, the last and lowest. In this way, the visitor travels from a garden inspired by mid-mountain flora (Cistus sp., Ballota sp., Lavandula sp., Globularia sp.), to Provençal food gardens (a vegetable garden, wild plants found which grow naturally with agricultural crops, fruit trees), and finally to shady gardens evocative of the mixing of species in a mild maritime climate (Hydrangea serratifolia, Tetrapanax sp., Hedichium sp.).

The terraces are planted according to the principles of agro-ecology, doing "as much as possible with and as little as possible against" (Gilles Clément). Gardening techniques include the introduction of green manures, annuals, edible plants and medicinal plants between the perennials, and very selective weeding (which I would describe as intelligent weeding). So weeds also find a place to take root.

All in all, the result is a garden that is truly wild. The aim is to bring the gardener back into the garden, and indeed visitors to the terraces, which have become a meeting place for plants, the environment and people.

Sad news



Members who attended the 2024 MGF General Meeting probably remember visiting Jean-Marie Rey's beautiful garden. We were informed of his death at the beginning of August. He was a nurseryman, a leading figure in local and French horticulture and a member of MGF and numerous international botanical associations. He leaves behind some magnificent gardens and has helped us on a number of occasions to organise garden visits. We will not forget him.

Reports on our spring outings:

A visit to tulip fields in Jonquières

In March, a group listened to a talk by Gilles Grillet then visited the colourful Triflor tulip fields in Jonquières, where tulip bulbs are cultivated before being sent to Holland for sale.

<u>Visits to Château de Brantes, the Harmas de Jean-Henri Fabre and</u> a Naturoptère

In April, we learned about the history and development of the gardens of the Domaine de Brantes in Sorgues, then visited the last residence of Jean-Henri Fabre, the famous 19th century Provençal naturalist, entomologist, and botanist.

Nurseries in the Drôme

In May, the outing in the Drome commenced with a visit to Pivoines Rivière, a specialist peony nursery, established in 1849, which grows over 600 varieties. In the afternoon the group visited, Iris du Val de Drôme, which has open days during the flowering period.

Un voyage en Aveyron

Also in May, Liz Godfrey organized a three day trip to gardens in the Aveyron and Tarn-et-Garonne. Five gardens were visited, three open to the public: l'Abbaye de Beaulieu-en-Rouergue, le Jardin de la Mothe, le Château de Bournazel, plus the private gardens of MGF members Liz Godfrey and Margaret Guérit.

The 2024 Assemblée Générale – minutes and photographs




The 2024 Assemblée Générale was held on 29 May, in Hyères, in the Var. Minutes of the meeting are now available in the 'Members' section of the MGF website.
